Greetings Council Members,

I am not a rescuer, or an animal activist, or a politically motivated individual. I am a homeowner, taxpayer, working individual, who happened to adopt a rabbit from a shelter. Three years later I was maxxed out at three rabbits. One adopted from my own area, one adopted from the Treasure Coast Humane Society, and one I brought home from a vacation in the Florida Keys. (She originated from their Pet Supermarket before ending up at the shelter).

I am now a 5 year Rabbit Mom veteran and I have followed the FB Pages of the rescues and shelters that assisted me and provided education. It is from the pages of these animal angels that I have learned *why* it is so important to prevent animals from being sold as "pets" while being treated as "merchandise" up to the point of sale.

It was the adoption of my third rabbit in the Florida Keys that brought to me the understanding that people.....regular people.....COULD do something that would have a positive impact for the animals, for the community, for the rescues, for Animal Control, and for the wallets of the nameless multitudes who donate on behalf of the unprotected animals. I discovered that the City of Key West had enacted an ordinance which stopped their local Pet Supermarket from selling any small animals (which

subsequently were turned in to the shelter and completely out-paced the adopter pool). When I discovered that their Pet Supermarket then hosted adoption events, I had the answer for my local City Council and our own Pet Supermarket. (There was no fight, no outcry, and now fewer people trying to "re-home" their unwanted rabbit).

It is disheartening that the rabbit community has not done more to get rabbits included on the Pet Sale Bans already in place, let alone new ones. The problem is that the people devoted to rescue are completely immersed. They barely have time to keep a social media page. The people who volunteer generally have jobs, families,and rabbits. They do not have the considerable time allowance to piece together the education that would get their local legislators to act. And....most people aren't fond of public speaking. It is why I am contacting you. It is THAT important for *someone* to speak up.

What you are considering is *needed* (desperately). You are shining a light on a dirty secret from which the general public is just about completely ignorant. Until I became a multiple rabbit mom, I had NO idea how the pet trade functioned or that people raised their animals in such inhumane conditions. You are in a position to be leaders in a movement that *will* gain momentum once the few have the courage to take the first steps.

I am attaching a PDF of clippings from various FB Posts from the Rescues I loosely monitor. These are just a highlight of the last month or so. They represent the currently endless cycle I have observed for the last 5 years. I hope it helps you all to unanimously vote for change.

So once again from all of us here at Gainesville Rabbit Rescue but especially Little Bo Peep, thank you for caring and adopting t



Mr. Burns came to us with multiple facial abscesses from infected bite wounds that a guinea pig had inflicted on him. His previous owners had tried to house him with a guinea pig and obviously things did not go well.

Rabbits need an "Exotic" Veterinarian. The cost for this is "extra". Most people who purchase a rabbit have NO idea that: A) The rabbit will NEED to be spayed or neutered in order to be a good pet and B) will require a specialized Veterinarian costing more money.

We got a call today from a sister rescue in Ft. Lauderdale that received a number of bunnies crammed together in a small rusty cage. The filthy cage was thrown in a dumpster just before a tropical storm was projected to arrive in the area.

Inside the cage were 2 adult bunnies and 9 baby bunnies, 6 of which were trampled to death. The other rescue has 70 bunnies on hand and they also rescue other animals. They are maxed out on space and needed help.

They reached out to us and although we are also at capacity, we could not turn them down. We will take the survivors and care for them in the same compassionate way we treat all of our bunnies. How many other bunnys are trashed in similar ways and are not lucky enough to be rescued? The practice of breeders or pet stores selling

not spayed/neutered rabbits must end. If bunnies were neutered or spayed before their sale it would greatly increase the cost of the bunny, decreasing the likelihood that the rabbit would be used for snake bait or in primitive religious practices (not an uncommon practice here in south Florida). It would also help stop the proliferation of unwanted babies.


Not only is she a cutie, but she is sweet, loving and she us not letting her injury stop her.

Meet our Bunny of the Day Rocky!

To look at Rocky today, you would never know what a difficult ordeal he had to go through. Rocky first came into rescue in September, when a kind person who had seen him running loose in her neighborhood for a couple of months was finally able to capture him. He seemed to have lost the use of his hind legs, and could only drag himself along on his front legs, making it easy to catch up with him and pick him up. The poor bun had a puncture wound that was oozing pus, was unable to stand up, and his hind area was soaked with urine. His rescuer made several phone calls to locate a vet who could see him immediately. Rocky was found to have bot fly (a parasite that can burrow into a wound or under the skin), severe urine scald and fleas, and required surgery to remove the larva and dead skin resulting from the bot fly.

After the surgery Rocky's rescuer took him home and nursed him back to health, with meds and some gentle bunny PT to help him feel better and build up his strength. Rocky required several more medical followups and at first was fed Critical Care and water by syringe, but even in his weakened state he loved his veggies and would eat those on his own. Rocky made great strides, and eventually regained full use of his hind legs! His great determination to overcome all obstacles and fight through this unfortunate situation earned him the name of Rocky. He now has no remaining side effects from any of his injuries, is fixed, and is completing his litter box training.

Update on the bunny rescued from a busy avenue in Pompano Beach, FL:

This baby (between 3-4 months old) went to see the eye specialist today. While it is really hard to discern exactly what happened to him, the vet strongly believes that is a fairly new and major trauma. We are not surprised at that conclusion as he was rescued from a busy avenue. A person who works at a nearby said that he was seen running between cars. So it seems logical to assume that a vehicle did indeed hit him.

Fortunately he has no fractures, but he is far from being OK. He is currently on pain meds, antibiotics and prescriptions for his visibly damaged eye.

We were told by a local businessman that it is normal that bunnies are dumped in this area and that most of them are found dead on the street. He said that this one was the lucky one.

It is truly heartbreaking what people are doing to bunnies. Officially rabbits are considered the third most neglected, abandoned and abused animal in the US. We disagree, and feel that rabbits take the number one spot.

While dogs and cats (mostly dogs) are covered by laws, rabbits have no such protection and records are not kept.

In addition, when we need help from law enforcement, most of the time they will not help us. Their excuse is "...

we don't deal with rabbits...please contact wildlife". And then wildlife officers will not help us as we are dealing with domestic rabbits, not wild ones. Everyone looks the other way.

As such we only have you to help us to educate people about proper rabbit care. If you know someone who wants to obtain a rabbit for their child, please let them know that rabbits are not starter pets. They can be time consuming, require regular feeding and care, and can be expensive to maintain. Vet care may occasionally be needed, and not all veterinarians treat rabbits. Those that do often charge high fees.

Also rabbits are not pets that should be housed outdoors, exposed to the elements, in a hutch, especially hutches with wire bottoms. They are social animals and enjoy indoor comforts just like dogs and cats. When you go to pet stores please EDUCATE the sales people. We have witnessed several interactions between new rabbit owners and pet store sales people wherein much misinformation was relayed. On a few occasions we were able to educate people concerning the realities of rabbit ownership. But that is rare, as we don't frequent pet stores.

The norm is that people continue to impulsively buy baby rabbits and them trash them like pieces of garbage a few days later. It is a vicious and sadly repetitive cycle.

Please help us educate others so that we can save at least a few of these gentle creatures. Thank you.
