In Memoriam: Before the hustle of this week begins, it's important to note that today is the third anniversary of the Parkland massacre, which claimed the lives of 14 students and 3 staff members at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School. Our thoughts are with those who suffered loss that day and with all of Florida as we collectively mourn the anniversary of that unspeakable tragedy.

Final Committee Week: Tomorrow marks the beginning of the final committee week ahead of the 2021 Legislative Session in Tallahassee, and it promises to be the busiest one yet.

Numerous House budget subcommittees will meet to go over local budget requests, and the Joint Legislative Budget Commission will consider budget amendments from the Departments of Legal Affairs, Transportation, and Agriculture and Consumer Services.

Look Back: Last week, we saw a shakeup in the administration continue with Shane Strum leaving his position as chief of staff to the governor to become Broward Health's CEO. So far, Gov. Ron DeSantis has not announced who will replace Strum. According to news reports, leading candidates include Director of Legislative Affairs Stephanie Kopelousos, Deputy Chief of Staff Adrian Lukis, Budget Director (and GrayRobinson alum) Chris Spencer, and Department of Education Chief of Staff Alex Kelly.

News surrounding the COVID-19 pandemic continues with the state now reporting more than 1.8 million cases. However, daily new cases remained below the five-figure mark every day last week, and there have now been more than 2.5 million vaccine doses administered.

Summary of Committee Week Four (Feb. 8-12) and Preview of Week Five

Week in Review

In case you missed it, here is an update on last week's legislation to watch:

COVID Health Care Liability Protections Legislation (PCB HHS1 21-01/<u>SB 74 by Sen. Brandes</u>) —The Senate Judiciary Committee approved SB 74 on a 6-4 vote. It now heads to the Senate Health Policy Committee.

Dues and Uniform Assessments Legislation (SB 78 by Sen. Rodrigues) —The bill passed the Senate Judiciary Committee on a 6-4 party-line vote. The bill now heads to the Senate Rules Committee.

Vacation Rental Preemption Legislation (<u>HB 219 by Rep. Fischer/SB 522 by Sen. Diaz</u>) — The House Regulatory Reform Subcommittee voted 10-7 to advance HB 219. Its next stop is the House Ways and Means Committee.

Cooperative Advertising Agreements Legislation (<u>HB 73 by Rep. Tomkow/SB 1062 by Sen. Brodeur</u>) — HB 73 cleared the House Regulatory Reform Subcommittee on a 9-8 vote. It now heads to the House Commerce Committee.

Vaccine Fraud Prevention Legislation (<u>HB 9 by Rep. Zika</u>) — The House Criminal Justice and Public Safety Subcommittee voted unanimously in favor of HB 9. It now goes before the House Judiciary Committee.

Building Design Legislation (<u>HB 55 by Rep. Overdorf/SB 284 by Sen. Perry</u>) — The House Regulatory Reform Subcommittee approved HB 55 on a 12-5 vote. It now heads to the Local Administration and Veterans Affairs Subcommittee.

Week Four Preview

COVID Business Liability Protections Legislation (HB 7 by Rep. McClure/SB 72 by Sen. Brandes) This previously reported-on liability protection measure continues moving forward on the fast track of the Legislature.—The Senate Commerce and Tourism Committee will hear SB 72 on Monday at 3:30 p.m. The House Judiciary Committee will hear HB 7 on Tuesday at 4 p.m. At this pace, both bills could be ready for final passage the first week of legislative session.

Craft Distilleries Legislation (SB 46 by Sen. Hutson) – The bill would raise the cap for the craft distillery designation from 75,000 to 250,000 gallons a year and allow distilleries to sell their products by the drink for on-site consumption in addition to selling sealed containers for off-site consumption. It would also allow craft distilleries to conduct tastings and sales at farmers' markets, festivals, or other similar events. The Senate Commerce and Tourism Committee will hear SB 46 on Monday at 3:30 p.m.

Resiliency Legislation (HB 315 by Rep. LaMarca/SB 514 by Sen. Rodrigues) — The bills would establish the Office of Resiliency under the executive branch and set up a Sea Level Rise Task Force to study and make projections on sea-level rise. The chief resiliency officer, a gubernatorial appointee, would chair the nine-person task force while the chief science officer of the Department of Environmental Protection would serve as vice chair. The Senate President and House Speaker would each name one member. Representatives from the Department of Transportation, Division of Emergency Management, Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services, Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, and the Department of Economic Opportunity would make up the remainder of the commission. The Senate Environment and Natural Resources Committee will hear SB 514 on Monday at 3:30 p.m.

Right to Farm Legislation (SB 88 by Sen. Brodeur) — The bill would expand Florida's Right to Farm Act by restricting the types of civil lawsuits that can be filed against farms and requiring that plaintiffs prove noncompliance with state or federal requirements to prevail. It would also apply

those protections to farms in the "agritourism" industry. The bill does not yet have a House companion, but it is a priority of Senate President Simpson, who is also an egg farmer. The Senate Environment and Natural Resources Committee will hear SB 88 on Monday at 3:30 p.m.

Vacation Rental Preemption Legislation (HB 219 by Rep. Fischer/SB 522 by Sen. Diaz) — The bills, similar but not identical, generally would preempt local ordinances regulating vacation rentals and set up a statewide regulatory framework for the industry, requiring platforms like Airbnb to collect and remit tourism taxes. In addition, property owners would have to display their vacation rental license, sales tax registration, and tourist development tax account numbers on site. Platforms would verify the license quarterly and delist any noncompliant property within 15 days. The bills would not supersede local ordinances enacted before June 1, 2011, or those less restrictive than state regulations. The Senate Regulated Industries Committee will hear SB 522 on Tuesday at 12:30 p.m.

Beverage Law Legislation (SB 148 by Sen. Bradley) — The bill would allow restaurants to continue selling alcoholic beverages to-go after the pandemic ends. Currently, the pandemic state of emergency declaration provides restaurants with the ability to sell to-go cocktails. The bill would require customers to purchase food alongside to-go and delivery drinks. The Senate Regulated Industries Committee will hear SB 148 on Tuesday at 12:30 p.m.

Educational Scholarship Programs Legislation (SB 48 by Sen. Diaz) — The bill would streamline the state's K-12 scholarships by folding the Florida Tax Credit Scholarship and Hope Scholarship into the Family Empowerment Scholarship and merging the McKay Scholarship Program for Students with Disabilities and the Gardiner Scholarship Program into a new program called the McKay-Gardiner Scholarship Program. The Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on Education will hear SB 48 on Wednesday at 3:30 p.m.

Technology Transparency Legislation — The House Commerce Committee will hold a workshop on draft legislation to create the Technology Transparency Act. The proposal, a priority of the governor, would impose a series of requirements on social media companies, such as Facebook and Twitter. The requirements include informing users of any change of terms of services; allowing people to opt-out of content algorithms; levying \$100,000 daily fines for "deplatforming" candidates for office; and creating a "cause of action" pathway for legal action from the attorney general or private citizens under the guise of deceptive and unfair practices. The committee will hold the workshop on Wednesday at 4 p.m.

Online Retailers Sales Tax Legislation (HB 15 by Reps. Clemons/SB 50 by Sen. Gruters) – The bills, although not identical, would require online retailers that make more than \$100,000 in sales to collect and remit sales tax, whether or not they have a physical presence in the state. Currently, only retailers with a physical presence in Florida must collect sales tax, and buyers must send the Department of Revenue a check for the tax the retailer would have collected. However, few buyers

send those payments. Past analyses estimate the change would increase state revenues by \$480 million. The Senate Finance and Tax Committee will hear SB 50 on Thursday at 9 a.m.

Dues and Uniform Assessments Legislation (HB 947 by Rep. Plakon/SB 78 by Sen. Rodrigues) – This controversial union-busting bill has a House companion (filed last week) and appears on path for a full Senate vote the first week of session. As the final stop before a floor vote, the Senate Rules Committee will take up SB 78 on Thursday at 9 a.m.

Federal Spotlight

U.S. House committees speed through budget work

With a deadline of February 16, 12 House committees marked up legislation this week to apportion the \$1.9 trillion in COVID relief approved by the U.S. House and Senate. The individual bills would implement President Joe Biden's American Rescue Plan, delivering direct payments, grants, and access to credit to individuals, families, small businesses, and state and local government entities. Some highlights:

The **House Education and Labor Committee** approved \$130 billion to help K-12 schools reopen safely. (Separately, the Centers for Disease Control issued <u>new guidance for reopening schools safely today.)</u>

The **House Energy and Commerce Committee** approved \$7.6 billion for the Federal Communications Commission to support broadband Internet access for schools and libraries.

The **House Financial Services Committee** approved \$25 billion in emergency rental assistance and \$10 billion in homeownership assistance, most of which states, counties, and cities will distribute. They also voted to reestablish the State Small Business Credit Initiative originally created in 2008, allocating \$10 billion to the states to support up to \$100 billion in small business financing.

The **House Oversight and Reform Committee** approved \$195.3 billion in payments to states and the District of Columbia and \$130.2 billion in payments to cities, towns, and counties.

The **House Ways and Means Committee** approved \$593 billion in direct payments and tax credits to individuals and households. Individuals with income under \$75,000/year and couples with income under \$150,000 will receive payment of \$1,400 apiece; this amount will decrease as income increases, up to \$100,000 per individual or \$200,000 per couple; no one earning more than that will be eligible for payments.

The House Education and Labor Committee also approved a new federal minimum wage of \$15/hour as part of its spending bill. This provision was not part of <u>S.Con.Res.5</u>, the budget reconciliation agreement, and some have argued that the reconciliation process cannot include the provision since it is not explicitly a spending measure.

All of these bills go next to the U.S. House Budget Committee, which will consolidate them for action on the House floor. House and Senate Democratic leadership want to get a final bill to the president before many unemployment benefits expire on March 14.
