SUBJECT: 2021 Legislative Session – Week 5 Summary (March 29 – April 2)

Tomorrow (Monday, April 5) all individuals ages 18 and older are eligible to receive the COVID-19 vaccine (16 and up for Pfizer) thanks to recent efforts by Gov. Ron DeSantis to expand eligibility and access to the shot as quickly as possible. This is a major milestone in the fight against the virus. However, it doesn't come without its challenges.

Following reports that the Biden Administration is working on a system for people to prove they have been vaccinated against the virus, the Governor issued an executive order to ban the use of "vaccine passports" by businesses or local governments in the state of Florida. This order, on one hand, is consistent with the Governor's approach to virus and its impacts on Florida from the outset, but the decision is already drawing criticism from some businesses and schools looking to assure all of their customers and students it is safe to return. Where will this issue land? – Likely in the courts.

On Friday, the U.S. Department of Labor released its March numbers showing the addition of 916,000 jobs across the nation. This is nearly double February's reported numbers and the highest increase since August. While the economy is not out of the woods yet, this is a positive sign that as the momentum for vaccinations increase so does the pathway to a sustained recovery from the pandemic recession.

This week, Gov. DeSantis signed the first bill into law from the current legislative session. The COVID-19 liability protections measure, a top priority of legislative leaders and the Governor, takes effect immediately. These retroactive protections and proactive guidelines will protect Florida's business, health care, government and non-profit communities from frivolous claims (that do not provide clear and convincing evidence) arising from or related to COVID-19.

Another of the Governor's priorities may also be on the way to his desk soon. Following the House's passage of HB 1 (along party lines), Senate President Wilton Simpson referred the controversial HB 1 (Combating Public Disorder) to only the Senate Appropriations Committee. The Senate version of the same bill, which would increase penalties for certain crimes committed during protests, has been held up in its first committee stop, the Criminal Justice Committee, by Chair Sen. Jason Pizzo who opposes the bill. The President's procedural maneuver makes this leadership-backed measure more likely to reach the Senate floor.

This is a big week for the state budget. Both chambers are readying to pass their respective spending plans and preparing them for conference. The Senate's Appropriations bill (SB 2500) and the House's General Appropriations Act (HB 5001) are both on their respective chamber's Special Order Calendar for Wednesday. The House proposal, which calls for \$97.1 billion including \$5 billion in reserves, according to the House press office "prepares Florida today for a better tomorrow" by focusing on long-term needs over. short-term personal priorities. The Senate proposal, which calls for \$95 billion including \$5 billion in reserves, according to the Senate press office "responsibly plans for Florida's future with significant reserves" by safeguarding key government functions and addressing the decline in revenues.

Meanwhile, Gov. DeSantis plugged some of his budget priorities last week. On Tuesday, the Governor highlighted progress on one of his top priorities since taking office at a press conference, where he mentioned robust funding for Everglades restoration and water infrastructure in his budget. This was followed by the Governor on Thursday announcing a proposal to provide \$1,000 bonuses for Florida's principals and teachers.

All of <u>these</u>, a preview of <u>Week 6</u>, our <u>Federal Spotlight</u> and current <u>Session Statistics</u> are detailed below.

Activities on Behalf of Port St. Lucie

<u>Appropriations Projects</u> – In addition to the projects listed below, our team is working with the City's staff to ensure that the FRDAP grants are funded enough to cover the City's large project that is ranked fifth on DEP's list.

The Senate has funded two of our appropriation projects, which positions us well for budget conference.

Port St. Lucie Septic to Sewer Conversion Program – HB 2123 and Senate #1952 – House Referred to Agriculture & Natural Resources Appropriations Committee. Approved on March 11. The Senate funded this project at \$250,000 (Line 1607A).

Port St. Lucie – St. Lucie River/C-23 Water Quality Restoration Project (Areas 5 & 6) – Senate #1958 and HB 2125 – Referred to Agriculture & Natural Resources Appropriations Subcommittee – Approved on March 3. This project is now eligible for inclusion in the House budget.

Port St. Lucie – St. Lucie River/C-23 Water Quality Restoration Project (Area 4) – Senate #1957 and HB 2127 – Referred to Agriculture & Natural Resources Appropriations Subcommittee. The Senate funded this project at \$500,000 (Line 1607A).

Hegener Drive Extension Tradition Center for Commerce – HB 2159 and Senate #2038 – Referred to House Infrastructure & Tourism Appropriations Subcommittee

Tourist and Convention Development Taxes – HB 1429 (Avila) and SB 2008 (Diaz)

Key Take Away

Proposing changes to the Tourist Development Tax (TDT) statute that would require a county to renew its existing TDT via referendum no later than July 1, 2026. If the TDT passed at that time, it would then have to be renewed every five (5) years thereafter via referendum. Any new pennies levied would also have to be approved via referendum.

Combating Public Disorder – HB 1 (Fernandez-Barquin) and SB 484 (Burgess)

If passed, would increase several penalties for crimes committed in the course of a riot. Important to municipalities and counties, the legislation would provide an appeal mechanism for citizens to challenge a decrease in funding to the police department, as well waive sovereign immunity for municipalities that inhibit a local law enforcement's ability to protect citizens during a riot.

If passed, would revise definitions for "retail sale" and "mail order sale" to capture internet sales, and thus enforce the sales tax on internet sales. Amended to require certain amounts to be deposited into the Unemployment Compensation Trust Fund during specified periods and to offset the Business Rent Tax through a reduction from 5.5 to 2.0%.

Key Take Away

Requiring solar facilities to be a permitted use by right in all agricultural land use categories in applicable local governmental comprehensive plans and zoning districts within certain areas; requiring solar facilities to comply with certain local requirements; requiring certain lands classified as agricultural to maintain such classification if the land is leased for certain renewable energy purposes; providing that the Florida Electrical Power Plant Siting Act does not apply to a stand-alone or co-located alternative or renewable energy facility that meets certain requirements.

Summary of Session Week 5 (March 29 – April 2)

In case you missed it, here is an update on last week's legislation to watch:

Civic Education Curriculum Legislation (<u>HB 5 by Rep. Zika/SB 1450 by Sen. Rodriguez</u>) — The bills would require high school government classes to include a comparative discussion of political ideologies, including communism. The bills would also require the Department of Education to create a media library "including first-person accounts of victims of other nations' governing philosophies." The House proposal, endorsed by House Speaker Sprowls, unanimously passed the full House on Thursday. An identical bill in the Senate awaits its last committee stop, the Appropriations Committee.

Motor Vehicle Rentals Legislation (HB 365 by Rep. Caruso/SB 566 by Sen. Perry) — The bills would regulate the emerging peer-to-peer car rental industry by requiring rentals to levy a \$1-a-day surcharge and charge sales tax. While the current language of the bill reflects an agreement in principal between peer-to-peer platforms and traditional rental car companies, the bill still lacks a requirement that the platforms have a formal agreement with airports before operating on their property. Such a requirement has been included by nearly every state that has passed similar legislation and already exists in Florida statute for other disruptive technologies such as transportation network companies (TNCs) and autonomous vehicles. The Senate Transportation Committee unanimously voted in favor of the bill on Wednesday, but with several Senators expressing a desire that the airport piece be addressed. The Senate bill is now ready for its final stop in the Appropriations Committee. The legislation was also discussed during the Office of Economic and Demographics Research's Revenue Estimating Impact Conference on Friday.

State Preemption of Seaport Regulations Legislation (HB 267 by Rep. Roach/SB 426 by Sen. Boyd) — The bills would preempt local government ordinances that "restrict or regulate commerce" at Florida seaports. The provision targets a Key West ordinance aimed at keeping cruise ships away from the island. The House bill favorably passed the Local Administration and Veterans Affairs Subcommittee on Thursday by a vote of 11 - 6, and now heads to its final committee stop. The Senate bill awaits its last hearing in the Rules Committee.

Foreign Influence Legislation (<u>HB 7017 by Rep. Grall/SB 2010 by Sen. Diaz</u>) — The bills would require organizations seeking state funding to disclose any financial ties to adversarial countries, or "foreign country of concern." The list includes China, Cuba, Iran, North Korea, Russia, Syria, and Venezuela. The legislation is a priority of Gov. DeSantis and House Speaker Sprowls. The Senate bill was unanimously passed by the Education Committee on Tuesday and now heads to

the Appropriations Subcommittee on Education. House Bill 7017 awaits its last committee hearing in the State Affairs Committee.

Constitutional Amendment Threshold Legislation (HJR 61 by Rep. Roth/SJR 1238 by Sen. Rodriguez) — The resolutions seek to raise the vote threshold to pass constitutional amendments from 60% to two-thirds. The House version favorably passed the Public Integrity and Elections Committee on Monday by a vote of 11 - 6. The bills are ready for their last committee stops in both the House and Senate.

Reemployment Assistance Legislation (SB 1906 by Sen. Brodeur) — The bill would increase the maximum weekly unemployment benefit from \$32 to \$100 and the minimum from \$275 to \$375. The current levels are among the lowest in the nation. The bill sponsor called his proposal a good starting point for talks. The bill favorably passed the Commerce and Tourism Committee on Monday by a vote of 9 - 1, and was subsequently advanced to its final stop, the Appropriations Committee.

Alimony Legislation (HB 1559 by Rep. Rodriguez/SB 1922 by Sen. Gruters) — The bills aim to end permanent alimony. They also include provisions that would default child custody time to a 50-50 split between parents. Similar legislation has made it to the Governor's desk in recent years, though it has been vetoed. The Senate bill passed the Judiciary Committee on Monday on a party line vote of 6 - 4. The House bill is awaiting its final stop, the Judiciary Committee.

Chief Science Officer Appointment – Gov. DeSantis announced the <u>appointment</u> of Dr. Mark Rains as Florida's next Chief Science Officer, who will be responsible for leading the Office of Environmental Accountability and Transparency.

Preview of Week 6 (April 5 - 9)

Barber Services Legislation (HB 855 by Rep. Nixon/SB 1176 by Sen. Stewart) — The bills would change barber regulations to allow for house calls. Current law only allows house calls for customers with debilitating health issues. The full House unanimously passed the measure on the floor Thursday. The Senate bill will go before the Senate Rules Committee, its final committee stop, at 9:30 a.m. on Tuesday.

Emergency Management Legislation (HB 7047 by House Pandemics and Public Emergencies Committee and Rep. Leek/SB 2006 by Sen. Burgess) – The legislation would update the State Emergency Management Act to better address and minimize threats that arise due to pandemics or other public health emergencies. It would address planning and preparations; require greater

transparency for emergency orders, delegated emergency powers, and emergency spending; and pull back the authority of local government emergency orders that restrict individual liberties; among other things. This priority legislation is moving quickly in both the House and Senate. The Senate bill will go before the Senate Rules Committee, its last committee stop, at 9:30 a.m. on Tuesday.

Online Sales Tax Packages (<u>HB 15 by Rep. Clemons/SB 50 by Sen. Gruters</u>) – The House Special Order Calendar for Wednesday contains both the House and Senate versions of the tax proposals. House Speaker Chris Sprowls and Senate President Simpson are presenting a united front on what they hope to accomplish with the online sales tax package. In a joint press release, their plan "prevents an unexpected tax hike on Florida businesses, creates a fair playing field with out-of-state businesses, and ensures necessary compensation for Florida workers seeking reemployment." On Wednesday, an amendment to HB 15 was jointly announced in a press release, highlighting "a major update to the plan that will result in a substantial cut – by more than half – to Florida's business rent tax."

Student Financial Aid Legislation (SB 86 by Sen. Baxley) — The bill originally would have limited Bright Futures scholarship funding for degree programs that are not seen as leading directly to a job, but it has been substantially reworked following outcry from students and parents. The bill would now put a hold on course registrations for college freshmen until they confirm they are aware of their chosen degree's job prospect potential. The bill is on Wednesday's Special Order Calendar in the Senate.

Resilient Florida Legislation (<u>HB 7019 by Rep. Busatta Cabrera/HB 5401 by Rep. Tomkow/HB 7021 by Rep. Busatta Cabrera/SB 1954 by Sen. Rodrigues/SB 2512 by Senate Appropriations/SB 2514 by Senate Appropriations)</u> — The legislation would create the Resilient Florida Grant Program within the Department of Environmental Protection to help local governments address the impact of sea-level rise and nuisance flooding. All three House bills and all three Senate bills are on the Special Order Calendars in their respective chambers for Wednesday.

Federal Spotlight

Yellen, Powell are optimistic about recovery - In virtual appearances before the House Financial Services Committee and the Senate Banking Committee this week, Secretary of the Treasury Janet Yellen and Federal Reserve Board Chairman Jerome Powell said this was a hopeful time, but a daunting one. "We should be clear-eyed about the hole we are digging out of," Secretary Yellen said. Despite rapid recovery in many sectors, the economy is still down about 10 million jobs from pre-pandemic levels. Chairman Powell downplayed concerns about inflation; although some price

pressures are already emerging, the Fed doesn't expect them to be large or persistent. Republican and Democratic lawmakers on both sides of the Hill urged Secretary Yellen to address the backlog in IRS processing and enforcement, and suggested that the filing date postponement to May 17 should apply to first-quarter estimated payments as well.

Momentum builds for action on infrastructure - Between the expiration of the FAST Act in September and the Biden administration's vow to "build back better," it seems almost certain that some form of infrastructure legislation will pass this year. Secretary of Transportation Pete Buttigieg told the House Committee on Transportation & Infrastructure yesterday that this is "the best chance in any of our lifetimes to make a generational investment in infrastructure." Full economic recovery will require a national commitment to "fix and transform" our infrastructure, Buttigieg said, because the status quo poses rising threats to our competitiveness and national security. The Administration's infrastructure priorities include clearing the backlog of repairs needed to existing infrastructure and improve public transit and mobility options, improving transportation reliability and safety, addressing major inequities, improving air quality, and tackling the climate crisis.
