Although our recent research has not been able to locate a record as to why the posted speed significantly differs between the two sections of Morningside Blvd, existing roadway conditions and adjacent land use appear to be comparable. The 85th percentile speed on both sections also appears to be very similar, irrespective of the posted speed. Historical data collected on both sections of this roadway has indicated the following vehicle speeds: 85th Percentile = North of PSL Blvd NB 42mph and SB 39mph / South of PSL Blvd EB 43mph and WB39mph. This data appears to confirm the basis for speed zoning indicating that driver behavior is effected very little by the posted speed and that motorists will travel at speeds at which they feel comfortable based on conditions. Studies have shown that without continuous police enforcement, speed limit violations tend to increase in zones with a

posted speed that motorists feel is unreasonable. This may be one reason why City Code section 71.01 designates the Chief of Police as the authority for determining safe and reasonable speed limits.

The Police Department has requested updated data be collected for the roadway south of PSL Blvd, so we will get this on the schedule.

2017 State Statute 316.189

1) MUNICIPAL SPEED.—The maximum speed within any municipality is 30 miles per hour. With respect to residence districts, a municipality may set a maximum speed limit of 20 or 25 miles per hour on local streets and highways after an investigation determines that such a limit is reasonable. It shall not be necessary to conduct a separate investigation for each residence district. A municipality may set speed zones altering the speed limit, both as to maximum, not to exceed 60 miles per hour, and minimum, after investigation determines such a change is reasonable and in conformity to criteria promulgated by the Department of Transportation, except that no changes shall be made on state highways or connecting links or extensions thereof, which shall be changed only by the Department of Transportation.

City Code Sec. 71.01. - Speed zones.

(a) For the purpose of this chapter the following definitions shall apply unless the context clearly indicates or requires a different meaning:

Chief of police. The chief of the city police department.

Municipal streets. All dedicated rights-of-way within the city limits, except state highways or connecting links or extensions thereof, and county-maintained roads.

- (b) The Chief of Police, in accordance with the procedures set forth in F.S. § 316.189, may determine and declare a reasonable and safe <u>speed</u> limit on any municipal street or portion thereof, which shall be effective at all times during hours of daylight or darkness, or at such other times as may be determined, as the appropriate signs giving notice thereof are erected. The procedure for establishing <u>speed</u> zones shall be as follows:
 - (1) Prior to establishing a new <u>speed</u> <u>zone</u> or changing an existing <u>speed</u> <u>zone</u>, the chief of police shall conduct an investigation to determine if the change is reasonable and in conformity with the criteria promulgated by the state department of transportation.
 - (2) Prior to posting signs establishing a new speed zone or changing an existing speed zone, the chief of police shall present to the city council his proposal concerning new speed zones and obtain the council's approval of the proposal.

The City's Comprehensive Plan indicates that Morningside Blvd is an Urban Collector for the entire length between Lyngate to Westmoreland.

SUBJECT: SPEED LIMIT ON S.E. MORNINGSIDE BOULEVARD

The speed limit on S.E. Morningside Boulevard from Port St. Lucie Boulevard to Lyngate Drive is currently posted 25 mph, which I believe is too low and should be changed for the following reasons:

- 1) This section of roadway is a divided north/south roadway with a bicycle lane on both sides. The southbound roadway feeds into a similar type roadway south of Port St. Lucie Boulevard, which has a 35 mph speed limit.
- 2) The present speed limit is below the speed limit allowed on most residential streets in our city.
- 3) This section of Morningside Boulevard does have a school zone along its path which is controlled by a "School Zone" flashing signal, as is the section of Morningside Boulevard south of Port St. Lucie Boulevard. The higher speed in that area has not caused any problems.

Attached is a 2-day speed study I had conducted on the roadway in question. Bear in mind traffic officers were in the area during this study which may account for slightly lower speeds.
