

Revitalize Eastern Port St. Lucie



Implement the Walton & One Master Plan

Walton & One will be a walkable, urban-style hub with a master plan that includes retail shops, restaurants, residential units, office spaces, hotels, entertainment venues, and public green spaces and trails with a **6,000-seat stadium** anchoring the development. The stadium will be home to the Port St. Lucie Sports Club, a new USL League One professional soccer franchise. The men's team matches are expected to begin in 2027, with a women's team to follow. The stadium will also host concerts, festivals, and other community events.

Reimbursement for a portion of the stadium and infrastructure costs will be from the Community Redevelopment Agency (CRA) using tax increment financing (TIF)—no general taxpayer funds are being used.

The Walton & One Master Plan includes:

- Up to 1,800 residential units
- Up to 100,000 SF retail / restaurant
- Up to 100,000 SF general office
- Up to 250 hotel rooms
- Over .5M SF in public spaces
- Nearly 2,000 parking spaces





Segment 3: Darwin Blvd to Gatlin Blvd.

Contract End Date: November 28, 2025

Port St Lucie Blvd. will be reconstructed from Darwin Blvd. to Gatlin Blvd. The existing open swale drainage system will be converted to curb and gutter and sidewalks will be added to both sides. This will match the proposed typical section both north and south of this project. Construction is partially funded through a Transportation Regional Incentive Program (TRIP) Grant.

• PSL Blvd.: Preliminary walkthrough action items, and final lift of asphalt are currently being addressed. Following the final lift of asphalt, any remaining asphalt corrections will be addressed as well as a final walkthrough.

St. Lucie River C-23 Water Quality Project at McCarty Ranch

McCarty Ranch Water Farm, a series of Above-Ground Impoundments (AGIs) to help remove harmful nutrients from the C-23 canal, and serve as a source for a future Surface Water Treatment Plant. AGIs 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5 have been completed.

- Mar 2026: AGI 7A is in the design process (60%) Final Design to be completed by March (\$720,000 funded)
- FY 2027/2028: AGI 7A construction expected completion(\$9,500,000 not funded)
- **FY 2029/2030:** AGI 7B design expected completion (\$720,000 not funded)
- **FY 2031/2032:** AGI 7B construction expected completion. (\$11,000,000 not funded)

Septic to Sewer Master Plan Annual Projects

Through the CDBG program City Council has continued to approve a dedicated budget of \$100,000 each funding year to provide water sewer connection grants to low-income households. To date 50 water sewer connections for low-income households have been funded with CDBG.

• 2025-2026 Indian River Lagoon Sagamore, Elkcam and Monterrey Waterways Grant (\$300,000): 11 of 73 available grant conversions completed to date. Pursuing additional funding via FDEP for \$4,750,000 over a five-year period.

Construction is now underway at O.L. Peacock Sr. Park, following contract execution in Oct 2025 and the official pre-con meeting held in Nov 2025. The project is supported by a FRDAP grant. There will be a number of upgrades to the park, including multipurpose, open field and event lawn areas, as well as upland walking trail loops.

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
St. Lucie West Boulevard Widening Project

- · Preliminary study completed that outlined the need for improvements
- · Final phase of the study is currently underway and Conceptual typical sections will be provided.
- · Project Limits: Peacock Boulevard to Cashmere Boulevard
- Major commercial corridor for the City that experiences peak hour congestion
- · Crashes are occurring along the corridor at a higher rate than the statewide average
- · Widening would provide significant operational improvements




Southbend Corridor Improvements

- Southbend Boulevard between SW Oakridge Drive and SE Becker Road
- Identified in the 2045 Mobility Study/Plan for proposed Improvements
- Currently completing a feasibility study that will include conceptual design and traffic analysis
- Conceptual locations for Intersection improvements include: East/West Snow Road, West Snow Road at Eagle Drive and South Eagle Drive



East Torino Parkway Improvements

- NW East Torino Parkway
 - NW Cashmere Boulevard from NW Peacock Boulevard to NW East Torino Parkway

Oak Hammock Drainage Improvements






Stormwater infrastructure is a critical asset, helping communities to avoid flooding impacts. Flooding occurs in this area during high-intensity wet weather events that generate several inches of rain in a short amount of time. Drainage in this area is challenged by low-lying topography, a shallow water table and soils with low infiltration rates. The project will:

- Enhance public safety by reducing the risk of flooding
- Protect the environment through improved water quality
- · Help minimize disruption and recovery costs after major storms
